## **Updates**

#### **COVID-19 vaccinations expand with Phase 2A and 2B:**

In First Nation communities, Nations are completing administration of the second dose of vaccine that was administered in early February. Shortly, individuals who are 50 and over will be able to book their second dose of the Moderna vaccine through their health centres.

The province announced that Indigenous people who live off-reserve and born in 1971 or earlier are now eligible to book vaccinations (or individuals who chose to take their vaccination off-reserve). Eligible individuals can <u>book online</u> or by calling 811 or through <u>participating pharmacies</u> across Alberta. With Phase 2B slated to begin in April, Dr. Deena Hinshaw said Albertans with high-risk underlying health conditions would be able to get the COVID-19 vaccine. The full list on the <u>Alberta COVID-19 website</u> includes: cancer, diabetes, immunosuppression, pregnancy, severe obesity, mental illness or substance abuse disorder that required hospitalization in the past year, learning disabilities or severe developmental delay, solid organ, bone marrow or stem cell transplant recipients and chronic heart, kidney, liver, neurological and respiratory diseases.

## **Vaccine Update**



#### WHO reports the AstraZeneca vaccine is safe:

Several countries have paused distribution of the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine over a small number of reports of blood clots. However, officials from the World Health Organization have stated there is NO causal relationship established between the shot and the health problems reported, calling the pause in use "a precautionary measure". AstraZeneca - which produced the vaccine with Oxford University - has insisted there is no evidence of an increased risk of pulmonary embolism or deep vein thrombosis. Health Canada continues to monitor this situation and has not paused the use of the AstraZeneca vaccine in Canada. In fact, the National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) has expanded its recommendation for the use of the AstraZeneca vaccine to now include people 65 years of age and over. NACI produces quidelines and recommendations, that provinces use to plan and implement their own vaccination rollout plans. Please note that the AstraZeneca vaccine used in Canada is from a different source (India) then what is currently being used in Europe. Until there is sufficient population immunity, Canadians need to continue their efforts in minimizing the spread of COVID-19 through the wearing of masks, staying home when sick, and practicing social distancing. We want to reiterate that:

- Vaccines are only approved if the evidence shows they are safe and effective.
- Regulatory processes were adapted to do an independent review as quickly as possible but at no time did we compromise on our **meticulous**, **in-depth review**.
- Health Canada's scientists and medical professionals **carefully review** all of the scientific data and evidence for vaccine safety, effectiveness and quality.
- Health Canada's oversight of COVID-19 vaccines does **NOT stop at approval**. We have a well-established safety system that supports collection of data from provincial public health, manufacturers and other sources, to monitor the safety and effectiveness of the vaccines being rolled out to Canadians.
- <u>Detailed information</u> on the vaccines and the evidence behind the decisions are easy to access and openly available.
- Other vaccines are currently under the same careful review and we anticipate more in the future.

**12,158** doses of vaccine have been administered in **46** Nations (bands) in Alberta.



At least **9,180** First Nations people have receive their first dose



At least **3,074** First Nations people aged 65 years and older living in reserve or crown land have received their first dose.



At least **1,151** First Nations people aged 65 years and older have receive two doses of the vaccine.



At least **2,876** First Nations people have receive two doses of the vaccine.
